Visit to Escola Parque school

Tuesday 19 June 2012 Barra da Tijuca, Rio de Janeiro

Escola Parque school has a strong focus on sustainability and was therefore an excellent forum for LEAD to engage and inspire the sustainability leaders of the future. The LEAD team arrived at the beginning of the school day and were introduced to an excited audience of around 50 students aged between 13 and 15.

Edward briefly introduced them to LEAD and our mission before asking them the question, 'Is a leader born or made?' This started a lively discussion about the skills needed to be a leader: trust, persistence, vision, the ability to think and listen, and to deal with the unknown. The students gathered in groups to analyse these leadership characteristics, and it was clear that they enjoyed the interactivity of the workshop and the chance to debate these important topics.

The students also had a chance to hear from LEAD Fellow Leonardo Martins Dias about his experiences working in the favelas of Rio, and the way that LEAD helped him to develop his potential as a sustainability leader.

At the end of the session the students showed their appreciation with a big cheer, and asked how they could continue the conversation about leadership. Leo has agreed to go back and deliver another session, and we were delighted that many of the students attended LEAD's event at the Peoples' Summit later in the week.
